It is fortunate that the seventh Earl Spencer had the foresight to remove a great deal of the architectural fittings, including doors from wonderful Spencer House in 1942 since it not only prevented them from being damaged by bombs and later while the building was used as offices but also it meant that when, under the aegis of Lord Rothschild the house was restored, highly skilled craftsmen could go to Althorp and take measurements and photographs to recreate the originals once more. This month marks the twentieth anniversary of the house's restoration and opening to the public. An anniversary well worth celebrating..


